Reviewer 1:

1. Page 2, line 8 can you add and more recently before the use of social-justice.

Response: We made this change.

2. Page 2, line 50. Can you add a sentence in our own words. You end too soon.

Response: We were unable to respond to this comment because we couldn't locate line 50 anywhere, and could not understand the original request.

3. Page 5, line 13, change the colon to a comma.

4. Page 6, line 27 delete the quotes around All Lives Matter.

Response: We made this change.

Reviewer 2:

1. The contribution, though, remains unclear. I would like to author to spend some time at the end of the paper—after the concept of gaslighting has been illustrated—to better flesh out the implications of the X for the X literature, both works in theory and empirical works. To make up the space, I recommend the author revisit point one and tighten the first few pages.

Response: In response to this suggestion, we added two paragraphs at the end of the section titled "Bridging Past and Present"—as a transition to the conclusion. We appreciate the suggestion to reflect on the implications of our work for X literature. Given the enormous scope of this literature, we returned, full circle, to ongoing debate and discussion of racial formation theory. We explicate in that section how we believe X offers complementary and new directions for theoretical and empirical research. We also include a footnote about how X is an invitation for intersectional analyses as well. We do not view X as a single-axis analytical framework, even though it may appear so at first.
